


2. UK 173 cases in 21 years


3. Popular demand









A Different Interpretation

But we aren't in Europe?









- 1. HRA gives European law too much power over UK law
- 2. HRA gives the courts too much power over Government


3. Rights inflations – common sense



- Give government more power
- Take power away from the judiciary




- Will stop checking new laws against human rights law
- Make it harder to appeal human rights decisions



- Public bodies to not have to safeguard our Human Rights
- Reduce our right to private and family life.

The British Bill of Rights



- Past behaviour may mean you are entitled to less human rights
- Make it harder to hold UK government to account (courts)

Declaration of Incompatibility



Positive Obligation

Government responsible for making sure something negative doesn't happen

Government should not cause something negative to happen

Article 2 Right to Life ECHR


Government are positively obligated to keep you alive

Government can't interfere in your life and kill you

Freedom of expression

Demonstrate significant disadvantage

First democratic government in history to repeal its own human rights

Magna Carta -1215

Bill of Rights

- 1. The Bill of Rights was written by James Madison.
- 2. It is the name of the first ten amendments of our Constitution,
- 3. These amendments contain many of the freedoms we hold bear.
- 4. The amendments were introduced to the first U.S. Congress.
- 5. The Bouse of Representatives adopted them on 21 Aug 1789.
- 6. They passed Congress by joint resolution on 25 Sep 1789.
- 7. Originally there were 12 amendments passed by Congress.
- 8. One of the remaining two was ratified in 1992 as Amendment 27.
- 9. One of the original copies is on display at the National Archives.
- 10. The Bill of Rights was ratified on 15 Dec 1791.

Independent Enquiry concluded:

There was no need to change the current Human Rights Act

The Government still trying to pass it anyway
